

Public Policy

A few months ago, the Thousand Oaks Planned Parenthood (PP) clinic was set on fire. Authorities believe that this was a deliberate act of arson by an anti-choice extremist. Our local area Planned Parenthood office has sent notices to supporters to raise funds to help reopen this office. With the publication of the much-edited videos purporting that PP is profiting from selling fetal tissue, opponents of Planned Parenthood have been reinvigorated in their attempts to shut down PP clinics and take access to reproductive health care away from thousands of men and women.

According to the AAUW Public Policy website, "AAUW trusts that every woman has the ability to make her own informed choices regarding her reproductive life within the dictates of her own moral and religious beliefs. Further, AAUW believes that these deeply personal decisions should be made without government interference. AAUW members have made the protection of reproductive rights a policy principle since 1977. Family planning fosters self-sufficiency, promotes preventive health care, and educates people on ways to protect themselves and their families from the spread of sexually transmitted infections (STIs).

The U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 ruling in Roe v. Wade legalized abortion for all women and found abortion to be a constitutionally protected fundamental right. However, in order for this to be more than just an abstract right, women must have real access to a full range of reproductive health and family planning options. Unfortunately, many vulnerable American women are being

denied fundamental control of their reproductive lives due to increasing restrictions successfully advanced by anti-choice lawmakers at both the state and federal levels.

The lack of comprehensive support for reproductive health has resulted in dire outcomes for American women. With many schools exclusively providing abstinence-only sex education and contraceptive care historically expensive to access, Americans' reproductive health has suffered. For instance, half of all pregnancies in the United States are unintended, and the United States continues to have one of the highest rates of STIs in the industrialized world."

I urge AAUW members to get active in this struggle. We hope to have a speaker from the Santa Barbara/San Luis/Ventura Planned Parenthood office speak to our branch in the near future. AAUW believes access to full reproductive health care is a basic right in this country. We should not allow extremists to send women's healthcare in the United States back to the 19th century.
