AAUW Fund Discussion: The Board voted unanimously to send \$750 designated to the Alicia Hetman Research & Projects Grant and \$250 to the Legal Advocacy Fund for the Branch 2015 contribution to AAUW Fund. Public Policy

AAUW is urging Congress to pass funding legislation that protects important programs and avoids ideological policy riders.

In a suggested letter to members of legislature, AAUW asks that appropriations for FY2016 promote access to education, defend civil rights, protect women's health, and reject ideological riders. AAUW opposes cuts to the Pell Grant programs, which allow more than eight million lowand moderate-income students to attend and complete college. They ask that any funding bill also protect the Violence Against Women Act programs, which improve the system-wide response to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

To protect civil rights AAUW asks that Congress ensures adequate enforcement of all laws through sufficient funding of federal agencies. The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEEOC) protects equal opportunity in employment for all workers. Without additional resources the EEOC would be limited in efforts to ensure that women receive equal pay. In addition, the Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights needs increased resources to continue its vigorous work on Title IX.

Lastly, Congressional decision-makers are being asked to support funding for the Title X Family Planning program and other federally funded preventive services that helped to avoid 2 million unintended pregnancies in 2013. To avoid threatening the strength of the budget agreement and risk government shutdown again, Congress must avoid poison pill riders. This includes limiting women's access to health care and tying the hands of enforcement agencies. In addition, appropriators should not add the Scholarships for Opportunity and Results Act to a funding bill.

On a state level there were some gains and some disappointments. According to the AAUW CA website, a bill on closing the gender wage gap, that if the Governor had signed, would have made California first in the nation to have a bill prohibiting employers from using prior salary history to establish new pay (AB 1017 Campos) was vetoed, along with another progressive bill to attack the gender wage gap, AB 1354 (Dodd) requiring state contractors to have plans in place for fighting gender pay inequities.

"The vetoes occurred on the last day the Governor could act, October 11th, by citing our biggest victory of the year, Senate Bill 358 (Jackson), which he signed, as the reason. SB 358 was a sorely needed update to California's Fair Pay Act. Not only does it prohibit retaliation for disclosing wages amongst coworkers, but closes a huge loophole used by employers when employees sued for wage discrimination based on gender. This was a tremendous victory that received national attention, the importance of which should not be discounted amidst our disappointment with the vetoes; but we know from the AAUW Analysis of Gender Pay Laws by State that multiple avenues

of addressing this problem are needed. This is particularly true after the recent disappointing news from the Census that the gender pay gap has barely budged in the last decade."

Kristen's Arroz Con Pollo

Ingredients

- 1 Pollo Asada
- 2 Pkgs Chicken Jalapeno Sausage sliced
- 3 Tablespoons Olive Oil
- 3 Bell Peppers red, orange, yellow strips
- 1 Yellow Onion diced
- 3 Cloves Garlic pressed
- 1 14.5 oz Can Diced Tomatoes undrained
- 1 Cup Fresh Parsley stems removed
- 1 1/2 Cups Brown Rice
- 1 Cup White Cooking Wine
- 1 Cup Chicken Stock
- Tony's to taste (Tony Cacherre's Creole Seasoning)

Directions

Heat oil in large kettle or skillet with a lid. Sauté onion, peppers, and garlic until just starting to soften. Add Pollo Asada, sausage and cilantro and sprinkle with Tony's. Sauté chicken until just done. Add tomatoes, rice, wine and stock. Add more Tony's if needed. Bring to a boil, then turn to low, cover, and steam for 45 minutes or until all liquid is absorbed.
