January was an eventful month for everyone in the US and for women in particular. Over one million people participated on January 21 in Women's Marches in the US and around the world. Estimated crowds were much larger than expected. While some may view these marches as Anti-Trump protests I look at them as a way to call attention to Women's Rights as human rights. Here are few facts that we need to remember about how hard women have had to fight for basic needs and fairness. Women did not have the right to vote until 1920. An unmarried women could not get birth control in all 50 states until 1972. Women could not serve on a jury in all 50 states until 1973. Women could not legally get an abortion until 1973 or sue for sexual harassment until 1977. They could be fired from their workplace for being pregnant until 1978. They could be refused a credit card in their own name until 1974. And they could find themselves paying different rates than a man for health insurance until 2010. Women are still not paid the same as men. I salute the women who have stepped forward in the past to challenge rules or policies that existed to make things better for all of us. The Women's March's on Jan 21 called attention to rights for fairness for not just women but for all.

I will again encourage you to become a member of the two minute activist. It is a good way to express your opinions to your representatives. This is one of the things I learned from the meeting with the AAUW lobbyist, Shannon Smith-Crowley.

Recently, Aileen has become the face of wage discrimination. She gained the attention of national media and has been interviewed by Maria Shriver of NBC, among others. Her testimony supported the Fair Pay Act as it made it's way through the California Legislature becoming the strongest equal pay bill in the nation.


