As we head into fall we can recall that we are almost a year away from the political debates and election controversies that were headlines. Now we are depending on the support of AAUW national to make sure that unfavorable changes are not made to Title IX or other educational policies and that we continue to work on the gender pay gap. An American Association of University Women (AAUW) analysis of newly released U.S. Census Bureau data indicates that women working full time on average still make 80 cents compared to every dollar men make. At the current rate of progress in closing the gap, women will not receive pay equity until the year 2119. Prior AAUW analysis found that even when accounting for education, occupation, hours worked, and other factors, women still earned seven percent less than men. Gender discrimination is a significant cause of the pay gap.

Locally we are continuing our scholarship support for young women entering a STEM career field of study. Joyce headed up the fundraising event again this year and she reports that enough money was raised at the wine tasting event to insure that we will again be able to offer \$1000 scholarships to two young women this spring. Thank you to all who supported this event or sent in donations.

Dianne has some terrific programs lined up for October and November, so be sure to look at her article and put these events on your calendar. Remember that these events are open to the public so consider inviting friends to hear these great speakers.

"Gender Bias at Work: What is the problem and how can we fix it?"

Sarah Thébaud, an Associate Professor of Sociology and a research associate of the Broom Center for Demography at the University of California, Santa Barbara will speak to this topic on Tuesday, October 10, at the Lompoc Library, Grossman Gallery, 501 E. North Ave., at 7 pm.

Dr. Thébaud's research identifies social psychological, organizational, and institutional-level factors contributing to gender inequalities in domains such as entrepreneurship, workplace authority, higher education, and the family. She received her Ph.D. from Cornell University in 2010 and completed a postdoctoral fellowship at Princeton University in 2012. Her research, between 2011 and 2017 has been published in "American Sociological Review ", "Sociological Science" and other publications.

Dr. Niki Sandoval, Education Director for the Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians will be our guest speaker on Thursday, November 2, at 7 pm at the Valley of the Flowers Church, 3346 Constellation Road, South Vandenberg Village. Dr. Sandoval will share ways that 'amuyich (a Chumash word that conveys the spirit of generosity) nurtures a vibrant and inclusive community. Dr. Sandoval is also a Lecturer in the Gervitz Graduate School of Education at UCSB. In 2013 Governor Edmund Brown appointed her to the CA State Board of Education, which sets K-12 education policy.

Dr. Sandoval will talk about her family and give the audience a brief history of Native American education and gender roles imposed by the boarding schools. She will discuss the role of Chumash women leaders as well as contemporary realities made possible through education. She will invite each audience member to consider her/his own power to stimulate change through love and generosity.
