AAUW History

- Established 1881 as Association of Collegiate Alumnae
- Marion Talbot and Ellen Richards met in Boston with 15 alumnae from 15 colleges
- Branch structure was established, 1884, with Washington, DC, as home of first branch
- 1886—New York, Pacific/San Francisco,
 Philadelphia, Boston formed

AAUW AAUW History (continued)

- 1885, first research report with Mass. Bureau of Statistics of Labor, "Health Statistics of Women College Graduates."
- 1888, first Fellowship granted to Ida Street from Western Assoc. of Collegiate Alumnae
- 1905, support for first federal pay equity legislation
- 1913, Report on Civil Service jobs and salaries, women 78% of what men earned

AAUW History (continued)

- ACA assists Marie Curie-purchase of one gram or radium. Daughter returns unused money which created Marie Curie Postdoctoral Fellowship
- 1921, SACW and ACA merge to form AAUW
- 1921, purchased headquarters building two blocks from White House
- 1938, 50th Anniversary, 521 branches, 36,800 members

- Santa Maria Branch helped organize branch/ donated \$25 to start
- Sponsored "Head Start" in Lompoc and selected the teachers

- 1st fundraiser for Fellowships—Garage Sale in Methodist Church basement
- Study groups—"The American Family in a Changing World" and "The World Problems"
- 74 members by May 1965, 65 at May meeting

- Started Observer Corps
- Authors Tea—Local Artists featured


