We have presented two more young women with scholarships, and have had participation in Tech Trek by sending five middle school girls to camp plus providing dorm Mom's to assure that they have a successful experience. We made a contribution to AAUW fund to help support larger goals of our organization. Speech Trek has been started and our initial competition will be this month. Our social activities keep us in touch and introduce us to others in our community. Each of us may pull a little something different from our membership, but we all benefit.

On the national level AAUW has awarded \$3.7 million to women and communities through fellowships and community action grants. Due to the longstanding, generous contributions of AAUW members, a broader community of women continues to gain access to educational and economic opportunities — breaking through barriers so that all women have a fair chance. Over 17,000 people learned to negotiate their salaries through the Work Smart/Start Smart programs. Over 270,000 messages were sent to lawmakers by AAUW members and supporters through the two-minute activist program. These messages are important as lawmakers act on bills that impact our economic security, civil rights, education, and Title IX. AAUW helps our voices be heard.

We need to continue in our support both locally and nationally of our goals to improve the lives of women and their families. Please remain active and invite potential new members to join us. Our next program will be a great time to socialize and learn. Hope to see you January 12!

Here is information about taking action in support of Dreamers. Congress punted this issue to 2018 so there is still time to show your support.

Tell Congress: Stand Up for Dreamers! Pass the Dream Act Without Amendment

For the past five years, the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program has provided nearly 800,000 recipients the ability to attend school, go to work, and contribute to our economy without fear of deportation. But with a simple swipe of the pen, President Trump has moved toward ending the DACA program, taking with it the opportunity for thousands of immigrants to achieve the American Dream.

DACA recipients – also known as Dreamers – are an integral part of our communities. Ninety-seven percent are either in school or employed. One-quarter are enrolled in institutions of higher education while another third are in high school and considering their options for postsecondary education and career training. AAUW understands the impact that education has on the lives of students and on the nation's overall prosperity and strength. The DACA program has opened the doors to higher education for thousands of Dreamers, while developing a skilled workforce prepared to compete in the global economy. Our commitment to increasing opportunities in education for all women and girls stands firm.

The President's decision to end DACA is both morally and fiscally irresponsible and Congress must take action. Tell Congress we must protect Dreamers and pass the Dream Act today!

The Dream Act is a bipartisan, bicameral bill that would offer many, including DACA recipients, protection from deportation while allowing them to continue to access education or work and contribute to our society. Our higher education system and our economy are stronger because of the contributions of DACA recipients.
