# AAUW Speech Trek

On April 18, 2020, Olivia Berman - a senior at Dunn High School in Los Olivos - was announced as first place in the Eleanor Stem Allen Memorial Speech Contest during the virtually-held annual meeting of the American Association of University Women California (AAUW CA). Olivia was one of three finalists in the competition at the State level and will receive a \$1,500 cash award. Jackson Patten of Stockton took second place (\$1,000), while Carter Hill of Foothills of El Dorado County took third (\$500). Honorable mentions: Namita Shyam (4th Place - \$250 award) and Gelasia Tiwana (5th Place - \$150).

High school students from throughout California are invited to compete annually. The topic "Are men and women truly equal today, or are the suffragettes of 1920 still suffering in 2020?" inspired lively speeches in the year of celebrating the 100th anniversary of the passing of the 19th Constitutional Amendment. The statewide contest begins at the AAUW branch level. Videos of the first-placed branch winners were submitted to CA AAUW for judging in March and the three finalists had been invited to speak at the annual AAUW CA Convention, which was then canceled due to the Covid-19 crisis. Judges from AAUW (outside of California) viewed the YouTube videos of the three finalists, the ballots were tallied and the results announced during the virtual CA AAUW Annual Meeting.

Olivia Berman has not made a final decision yet, but she will likely be attending Oklahoma State University in Stillwater majoring in Agricultural Communications. Olivia has been a member of the Lucky Clover 4-H club for nine years and is the club's president this year. She is also a Santa Barbara County 4-H Ambassador. Olivia has accumulated over 500 hours of community service with 4-H. This earned her the honor of being one of two "Youth in Service" award winners this year for the Santa Ynez Valley Foundation.
