Regarding membership, there is an Open Membership Toolkit: "This spring AAUW members will vote on a long-standing membership requirement, which creates a barrier to women who do not hold a college degree. By eliminating this requirement, AAUW can become a more diverse and inclusive organization, better aligned with the needs of women today."

Membership Matters

This has been a difficult year to stay in contact with members and to encourage new membership. Right now, I am showing that we have 80 branch members and 8 national members who live in the Lompoc area. With COVID-19 still keeping us at home and out of groups, it has been hard to maintain that sense of community that comes with membership. While many of us have enjoyed our Zoom programs, there are others who are not comfortable with that setting or the technology. Hopefully we will soon begin to see the impact of vaccinations and the other precautions that we all have to take. I think we will be hearing "wear a mask, socially distance and wash your hands" for some time to come, but just maybe we will be able to begin to gather sometime in the next year. Perhaps at that time we can all think of a person or two who would like to join us for the social aspect of our organization and/or because they support the causes and ideals of AAUW. An invite to a program or to join is the best way to add to our strength and increase our membership. One area of consideration is the vote that will take place this spring at the national level on a long-standing membership requirement, which creates a barrier to women who do not hold a college degree. Some of the considerations to eliminating the degree requirement are:

- By eliminating this requirement, AAUW can become a more diverse and inclusive organization, better aligned with the needs of women today.
- There are many paths to education beyond colleges and universities. As important as the P-12 and four-year college system is, education comes in many forms, including Career Technical Education, on-the-job training and similar education routes.
- We are an organization that promotes equity, yet we do not treat non-degree individuals as equal.
- Times have changed. Younger feminists care about our mission but don't join us because they see us as an exclusionary or elitist organization, one that hasn't evolved into modern thinking about equity and inclusion.
- Those who do not have degrees can be strong advocates for our mission.

Members can comment on the proposed amendment from January 11, 2021 through February 5, 2021 5:00 pm ET. Voting will open on April 7, 2021 and close on May 17, 2021, 5:00 pm ET. Go to the AAUW.org website for more information on this topic.

Women's Community Statement on President Trump's Removal January 10, 2021

On Wednesday, January 6, 2021, we watched as the President of the United States incited a mob to march on the Capitol to attempt to overturn the results of an election he lost eight weeks ago. We watched in horror as that mob of white nationalists stormed the U.S. Capitol building. And we watched as they tried, and failed, to subvert our democracy, leaving a trail of wreckage and terror in their wake.

This was not the beginning. This was an inflection point in years of hate and division incited by a President who does not care about our country or its people, but only about himself. He has stoked racism, sexism, antisemitism, Islamophobia, ableism, xenophobia, toxic masculinity and more — allowing those who share his beliefs to come out in the open and act without fear of repercussions and wreak havoc on the seat of democracy. The failed insurrection at the Capitol this week was shocking, but not without warning.

We come together today as a community of multi-racial, multi-generational, differently-classed gender justice leaders, who represent women, girls and gender nonconforming people from every corner of this nation, united in condemnation of these unconscionable actions. Together, we demand that our country's leaders uphold their Constitutional responsibilities and remove President Trump from office immediately. He must be held accountable. He has shown that he is an imminent threat to all of our communities, our nation and our very democracy. We cannot risk one more day under this President.

Now is the time for our leaders to do what is right and fulfill your obligation to the American people who elected you. The House of Representatives has committed to beginning impeachment proceedings, and the Senate must show up with a unified voice to swiftly do the same. If you fail to condemn white nationalists' violent extremism and hold the President accountable for his actions, you are neglecting your basic responsibility to serve the American people. Vice President Pence, members of the Cabinet, and Members of Congress, you each swore to "support and defend the Constitution of the United States." This is the moment for which that oath was written. And if you fail to protect this country, women and girls across this country will not forget.
