Joyce M. (Crumpton) Barker Women's Royal Astrailian Navy (WRAN)

Joyce Barker has been an involved citizen in the Lompoc community since moving to Vandenberg Village in 1985. Active in the American Association of University Women and Republican Women, anyone who has worked with Joyce will attest to her willingness to get things done. Much of her positive attitude about work and the role of women and her philosophy about active citizen participation stems from her experiences during World War II.

Joyce Crumpton was born in Melbourne, Australia on May 17, 1923. After she finished her early schooling in 1940, she went to work in an accounting office. Joyce remembers that as early as 1922, Australia knew that the Japanese

might invade their country. After Pearl Harbor, the citizens of Australia realized it was only a matter of time before the Japanese set their sights on the Land Down Under.

As a single woman of 19, Joyce, in her typical fashion, decided she was not going to wait around for the Japanese to attack. In 1942, she enlisted in the Women's Royal Australian Navy where she received early training as a telegraphist. After three months with this all-female group, she was serit to an Australian naval base to work as a radio operator. Shortly after, she and another WRAN members were drafted to serve at the American naval base in Melbourne.

Barker's U.S. Navy communication station intercepted messages from the Japanese Imperial Navy in Japanese Morse Code. Much of the information about her job was classified until the 50 year moratorium expired a few years ago, so today she feels more comfortable talking about her wartime responsibilities. Her job was to get information about the "who, where, and when" of the messages. The text of the messages was written in a numeric code that was deciphered by machines housed in the U.S. Navy office in Melbourne.

It was at the American base that the young Australian radio operator met an American naval officer who had just been evacuated from Corrigador. Ken Barker, who had studied Japanese in D.C. after his enlistment in 1937, worked as a code breaker and traffic analyst in her office. They courted for approximately 18 months before they were married. Because Joyce felt it

was not appropriate for them to be working in the same office and dating, she requested and was granted a transfer to a remote base in Victoria which housed a huge communication center. Here she used Royal typewriters that utilized the Japanese Kanji language.

The highlight of Ms. Barker's work as a telegraphist came one evening when she and her duty section intercepted a message about Admiral Yamamoto, the Commander of the Imperial Fleet of Japan. The message provided information about an upcoming inspection visit to the Japanese fleet at Guadalcanal. Ms. Barker later learned that two American B-38s shot down Yamamoto's plane as it neared its destination.
