



President's Report

Here we are getting ready to say goodbye to 2022, a time for reflection and hope. It hard to imagine all the profound changes that 2022 has brought to the lives of women, girls, and society.

In 2022 in the nation and state:

- We saw Ketanji Brown Jackson sworn in as the Supreme Court Justice, the first Black woman to sit on the highest court of the land.
- We celebrated the 50th anniversary of Title IX with people everywhere as U.S. Women's National Team won its landmark case against the U.S. Soccer Federation requiring equal pay for both male and female soccer players.
- We saw the Supreme Court end the 50-year constitutional right to an abortion. People stood together in protest, including here in Lompoc. We brought Planned Parenthood to speak to us on what branch members could do to support and protect those seeking reproductive care in our community.
- We saw California, with the strong advocacy from AAUW, codify the right to abortion and contraception in its constitution; we saw 13 states enact abortion bans despite most Americans standing in support of reproductive choice.

In the community AAUW continued to move the needle in 2022:

- · We were recognized by AAUW National as a *5 Star branch* based on our impactful work in support of the AAUW mission.
- We brought together a panel of local ChangeMakers: 4 incredibly diverse leaders, 3 of whom are women of color, from different fields to the speak on women and leadership.

- We sent a record number of 8th grade girls, (7!) along with 2 alumni junior counselors to UCSB for Tech Trek 2022, exposing them to the exciting fields of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) where females are underrepresented.
- We awarded 2 college scholarships to female high school seniors (Cabrillo and Lompoc High School) who are pursuing their education in STEM fields.
- We collaborated with the North County Rape Crisis Center and Child Protective Services in celebrating the work of college females who rode 1700 miles on their bikes to bring awareness to the fight against human trafficking.
- Following an honored branch tradition as a service to the community, we hosted a nonpartisan candidate forum. We collaborated with the city for the venue and with TAP TV for the simulcast of the forum. We brought dual language with live interpretation via Zoom to the forum providing access for the entire community, thanks to the sponsorship we secured from the Fund for Santa Barbara. As a result, the forum reached more than 280 people, a record high.
- Importantly, we were finally able to start to get together again in person thanks to the accessibility of COVID vaccines and boosters! The interest groups are back: we are Dining Out, we are Mission Walking, we are Reading and so much more! We even supported a local brewery with an fun informal get together at Cold Coast Brewing to celebrate the International Day of Kindness.
- · We celebrated the lives of long-time members, **Teney Leary** and Mary Vossler and are grateful for the positive impacts they made on our lives and in our community.
- December, we were invited by the League of Women Voters and the Santa Barbara County Commission for Women to collaborate on first "Women the Government" program, featuring the newly elected city council members from Solvang, Santa Guadalupe and Buellton along the newly elected Mayor of Lompoc (see picture to the right).



History is has a wonderful way of tying together the past, the present and the future. Lompoc, California has a long history of strong women working towards creating real change in the community. For instance the women behind the People's Union League worked tirelessly to reinforce the notion and practice of Lompoc's early years and founding as a temperance colony.

The notion that Lompoc's citizens would refrain from bringing alcohol and the habits of imbibing into the town was an incredibly powerful one for these early pioneers of the central coast. Female leadership within the townsfolk helped strengthen the resolve needed to remain a temperance colony for a number of years by forming the aforementioned People's Union League. Led by a Mrs. J.B. Pierce the P.U.L did just that when they pulled down from its very foundation a saloon as it served patrons. Mrs. Pierce would go onto lead more than one charge against the selling of liquor within the town limits of Lompoc. Set firmly in her believe that the temperance colony remain just that she marched upon a drugstore and set upon all its bottle of aromatics, spirits and more. This group of women, led by Mrs. Pierce, fiercely defended the town's attempt to raise their families under the umbrella of sobriety.

Though Lompoc is no longer even remotely close to a temperance colony the leadership and communal fortitude demonstrated by these early inhabitants is worth appreciating simply for its fearlessness. It's worth appreciating for its brash female driven coalition as well as its remarkable results in achieving, even if for a small time, the desired outcome of fighting for what was righteous at that moment.

I like to think that fearless brand of female leadership and comradery still exists today so many years later, in fact I know it does. One needn't look further to see the same passion for reinforcing

the need for access to great education, more human rights, accessible healthcare and the building of strong community involvement than right here right now in Lompoc, CA. Groups for women continue to grow in size, number and influence throughout the region. As more and more women continue to play larger roles in politics and community building this wonderfully historically significant trend will reach new heights. And now just like the saloon owners of the past found out, "to never under estimate the power of a woman", so too will more and more people of today.
