In a recent LA Times article, it was noted that more than half of Americans said their parents never discussed money with them, and women in general were less likely to receive instruction in wealth building strategies than their male counterparts. To help address these low financial literacy rates among women, AAUW produced a Women's Economic Empowerment Initiative (WEEI) online seminar series. The series highlights information and strategies to combat wage inequity faced by women. Classes are grouped as either "Money Smart" or "Work Smart". They provide a good introduction

or refresher to investment, personal finance, knowing your value in the labor market, and how to get paid what you're worth, among other topics. PCPA Theater Event



In Times Like These, Community Is Our Resistance

Lately, it feels like just being brown in this country puts a target on your back. Families are living in fear again. The news is filled with stories of aggressive immigration raids, people being followed or detained just because of the color of their skin, and laws being passed that make it harder for folks like us to live with dignity.

Even U.S. citizens, born and raised here, are getting caught up in this mess. The fear is real, and it's not just fear of deportation. It's fear of being seen as less than, of being made invisible or disposable.

This isn't new. But that doesn't mean we stay quiet. What's happening across the country is heartbreaking and infuriating. But here in Santa Barbara County, we can respond differently. We can show up for one another. We can support the organizations already doing the work, quietly and powerfully, to protect and uplift our immigrant and brown communities.

Groups like 805UndocuFund are providing rapid response and direct financial assistance to undocumented individuals affected by ICE activity, job loss, or emergencies. Immigrant Hope Santa Barbara is helping families navigate the legal system with dignity, offering low-cost legal support, English classes, and citizenship preparation. The Santa Barbara County Immigrant Legal Defense Center is out there fighting in court to keep families together.

These organizations are doing all they can, but they need us too. In Lompoc, I've organized a group of 40+ local volunteers who are helping in whatever way possible, whether it's translating, driving someone to an appointment, or sharing resources with families who don't know where to turn. If you want to volunteer, please reach out to me. There's always a way to get involved.

If you've been watching the news and feeling helpless, this is one way you can take action.

You can volunteer. You don't need a fancy title or background to make a difference.

You can donate. Even a small amount can help cover a DACA renewal fee or fund a ride to court.

You can share resources and remind people they are not alone. Santa Barbara County (Lompoc) is home to so many beautiful, resilient immigrant families. Let's keep it that way.

Public Policy

A Big Broken Promise to America's Students and Women

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congress has passed a bill that will go down in history not as a beautiful promise fulfilled — but as a **big broken promise** to America's students, working families, and especially to women.

From early learning through graduate school, this bill deals a devastating blow to educational opportunities in America. It slashes financial aid, eliminates vital student loan programs, and channels public dollars into private voucher schemes — all while doing nothing to ensure that participating schools uphold civil rights protections. Instead of expanding access, it erects new barriers that will shut out millions of students, especially women, low-income families, and communities of color. This bill makes drastic cuts to Medicaid, it threatens reproductive freedom and the health and economic security of the very people who rely on education as a path to a better future.

For AAUW, this is personal. We are the nation's largest non-institutional funder of women's graduate education. For more than 140 years, we've fought to open the doors of higher education to all women — not just those who can afford it. And we know the truth: when women lose access to education, they lose access to opportunity, economic security, and equity.

This bill:

• **Undermines educational equity** by using tax breaks to fund private school voucher programs without requiring participating schools to follow Title IX, Title VI, or disability laws — creating a loophole that permits legal discrimination against students.

• Shuts women out of higher education by eliminating Graduate PLUS loans and creating borrowing caps that disproportionately harm women of color, single mothers, and first-generation students.

• Attacks reproductive health and health care access by essentially defunding Planned Parenthood and making sweeping changes to Medicaid that will strip coverage from millions of women — leaving them without access to birth control, cancer screenings, and maternal care.

This bill does not reflect the values of fairness, inclusion, or opportunity. It is a deliberate rollback of hard-won rights, passed at the expense of women's futures and our nation's progress.

As the bill heads to the president's desk, AAUW calls on the administration to reckon with what this legislation truly means — and to recognize the irreversible harm it will cause to students, families, and our economy now and in years to come.

AAUW and our nationwide network of members and advocates will not stop fighting until every student — regardless of gender, race, income, or zip code — has full and equal access to education, civil rights, and opportunity.

Recipe Corner

Red White and Blueberry Fruit Salad

Equipment

small star cookie cutter

Ingredients

2 pints blueberries, or about 4 cups
1/2 small seedless watermelon
1/2 cup feta cheese, crumbled. You can also use Mexican cotija cheese.
1 <u>lime</u>

Garnish small mint leaves, optional

Instructions

- 1. Rinse your berries and put them in a serving bowl.
- 2. Slice the watermelon into thin slices. Use the cookie cutter to cut out stars. If the stars are too thick, carefully slice them in half. Add them to the bowl.
- 3. Top the salad with crumbled cheese and squeeze the lime juice over all.
- 4. The salad can be served immediately, garnished with the mint leaves, or chilled for later.
