Presidents' Report

What does a recipe for spaghetti and a successful career in STEM have in common? A July 2025 California AAUW presentation by civil engineer Eileen Velez-Vega to Tech Trek campers got me thinking about cooking. YouTube link is here: Velez-Vega Civil Engineer

After all, we sometimes learn how to cook from mentors, books, and now social media. It takes the right ingredients, in the proper sequence, time, skill, practice, sometimes luck, and hopefully the whole thing comes out right on time! Ms. Velez-Vega earned a bachelor of science and a masters degree in civil engineering. She credited her successful career to "the power of perseverance and managing the unexpected". Although the number of women in STEM careers (science, technology, engineering, math) are still low (26% of all STEM workers and 16% of engineers are women*), Latinas are only 2-3% of the STEM workforce, according to Ms. Velez-Vega. She credits internships during her time in high school and college that introduced her to professionals with STEM careers, and experiences outside her native Puerto Rico. These "key ingredients" to her career building included attending Space camp in 10th grade, a trip to Washington, DC, and in college interning at the Walt Disney World College Program in Orlando and the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama. From early exposure to teachers, mentors, maintaining interest in class work, interesting extracurricular activities (Ms. Velez-Vega was a folkloric dancer in school), internships and after school jobs, graduation, and then her first professional position. You may have already read a bit about this in the *Lompoc Vision*, but just in case you missed it—or if you're up for a longer version with a little more heart—I'm putting it all down here, thanks to Lucy, who gave me the green light to write to my heart's content.

Recently, we had the true pleasure of welcoming a group of young women from across the country to our city. Their stop in Lompoc was highly anticipated and lovingly prepared for by a dedicated group of community members who went above and beyond to ensure the team's visit was memorable. The efforts of Dinah, Kay, and Lucy to pull together all the moving parts weren't just helpful—they were remarkable. On behalf of all of us at the North County Rape Crisis and Child Protection Center, THANK YOU for your organization, your generosity, and your attention to every detail (especially the ones that often get overlooked).

A special thank you goes to the dream team behind the Welcome Bags—an idea that turned into something truly meaningful. Huge thanks to Barbara Bolton, Dinah Lockhart, Janet Blevins, Lucy Thoms-Harrington, and Carolyn Malkow for filling those bags with homemade goodies and thoughtful treats. The riders were thrilled to receive them and, after a long ride from Arroyo Grande, they truly appreciated the warm welcome and well-earned reward.

Swag Bags were also gifted to the riders, and they were a big hit—generating lots of "oohs" and "aahs" as the riders discovered all the surprises inside. These bags came together thanks to the generosity of Kay Duffy Taylor, Dinah Lockhart, Lucy Thoms-Harrington, and Barbara LeFebvre (one of our RCC Board members). Several local businesses also contributed, making the bags even more fun and special.

For those unfamiliar with Pedal the Pacific (PTP) and their connection to Lompoc, let me share a bit of context. Since 2017, different groups of young women—ranging in age from 18 to well-seasoned—have

cycled from Seattle, Washington to San Diego to raise awareness about the devastating crime of sex trafficking. That includes the trafficking happening right here in our own backyard.

The Center and AAUW have partnered since 2021 to support the Lompoc leg of their journey, and our relationship with the PTP leadership team has only grown stronger. In fact, this relationship has led to the Center receiving a \$5,000 grant to support our efforts in north county, specifically Lompoc. These funds help us educate the community, provide prevention programming, and meet the immediate needs of trafficking survivors—many of whom require a uniquely compassionate and trust-building approach. PTP's support helps us continue this critical work. And none of this would be possible without the unwavering support of AAUW.

While not everyone chose to support this year's visit—some citing misalignment with city policies—we were deeply honored to have the team recognized by Congressman Salud Carbajal, Senator Monique Limón, Assemblymember Gregg Hart, and 3rd District Supervisor Joan Hartmann.

This event would not have been possible without the generosity of our sponsors: the Santa Barbara County Commission for Women, C4 Lompoc, Kingdom Causes, Inc., Charles Walker Insurance, the Allan Hancock College Foundation, Hilton Garden Inn, Camins 2 Dreams, and Rob Glasgow—who gave the team a phenomenal tour of La Purisima Mission State Historic Park.

One of the most meaningful parts of the entire experience was witnessing the warmth with which the riders were received. With a rider seated at each table, AAUW members engaged, asked questions, shared stories, and cheered these young women on. The riders spoke about being filled up with your goodness and left Lompoc deeply appreciative of your support.

I also want to acknowledge Dinah for her inspiring presentation at the event, where she spoke with conviction about AAUW's mission and reminded us why we must continue pressing forward. As she said, this work isn't finished—and we can't take our foot off the pedal just yet. As a local agency supporting survivors of sexual assault, child abuse, and human trafficking, we rely on community support. Your commitment isn't just encouraging—it's essential.

Before I close, I have to mention the Comfort Kits. Honestly, when the project team floated the idea, I never imagined it would actually come together—but wow, did it ever. Huge thanks to all of you who donated and, yes, made Jeff Bezos a little richer in the process. The Amazon Wish List method worked beautifully, and now that the packages have stopped arriving, it feels a bit like Christmas is over. But truly—thank you. The kits are already being distributed, and according to our advocates, they're the best out there.

Small acts of kindness matter. Showing up for each other matters. And recognizing one another's efforts makes all the difference.

To every single one of you who showed up in a meaningful way—thank you. You helped make Pedal the Pacific 2025's visit to Lompoc not just impactful, but unforgettable.





Recipe Corner

Pepperoncini Dip

Scoop up this creamy pepperoncino dip appetizer with grilled baguette pieces or mini bell pepper halves.

Ingredients

- 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 2 tablespoons brine from pepperoncini jar
- 1/2 cup pepperoncini peppers stemmed, seeded, and chopped
- 1 cup mixed giardiniera (pickled mixed vegetables), chopped
- 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper

baguette slices, ridged potato chips, and/or vegetables, for dipping



Directions

Beat cream cheese in a bowl with an electric mixer at medium speed for 30 seconds. Beat in sour cream and pepperoncini brine until mixture is smooth. Beat in pepperoncini, giardiniera, red onion, Italian seasoning, salt, and crushed red pepper until combined.

Chill, covered, to allow flavors to meld, at least 1 hour (or up to 1 week). Serve with baguette slices, potato chips, and/or vegetables for dipping.
