### Dia de Los Muertos Community Celebration and AAUW is there!



### School Boards - The Overlooked Frontline of Democracy

Last month, Seena Trigas from the Public Policy School Board Project team, submitted an excellent article reminding members of the crucial role that public education plays in our democracy. The current - and seemingly never-ending - assaults on that institution gave rise to the School Board Project, which is now entering its third year.

When we started this project, our main focus initially was to encourage members to actively participate in identifying, recruiting and supporting candidates to run for school boards whose education values were in line with ours at AAUW California. For a number of reasons, our focus shifted to an emphasis on encouraging and

training members to attend school board meetings and let us know what they are seeing in their districts. We had a remarkable response, and we want to thank all our members who have answered that call.

As we enter our 3rd iteration of the project, we want to continue that momentum, but narrow the scope to watching for and speaking out against violations of California's protective laws; add a new component of learning how to make a greater impact by working in coalition with other public education supportive organizations; and swing back to where we started with re-engaging and increasing our efforts to ensure district board majorities that support all students and the free flow of ideas. In this last regard, we have recently discovered an organization called the School Board Integrity Project, and I can't say it better than their Executive Director, Kyrstin Schuette, as stated in an Op-Ed she wrote on September 3, 2025 in *The Courier*:

"The redistricting battle is important and we shouldn't minimize it, but it's equally important that we pursue local pathways to power to protect our families and our neighbors from the extremism sweeping our country. The solution lies in recruiting, training, and electing school board members who will practice good governance, pursue academic freedom and excellence, and foster schools where every student belongs."

Here's the hard truth: These is no gender equity without pay equity. Women are paid 81 cents for every dollar paid to men. That drops to 76 cents when including all earners. The gap is even worse for women of color. Women are falling behind while the costs for groceries, gas and health care soar.

AAUW is tackling this issue from multiple angles:

- -Offering salary negotiation, financial literacy and advocacy training.
- -Updating "The Simple Truth", the signature report on the gender pay gap to reflect the most current data.
- -Removing barriers to success. We advocate for a full range of policies to close the persistent gender and racial pay gaps and to address the unequal burden of caregiving that limits women's economic security.

We may have missed the Pay Equity Flash Campaign, but the campaign continues. Please consider donating to AAUW Funds this year to support this and all of AAUW's priorities.

### Recipe Corner

## **Creamy Roasted Garlic Soup with Kale**

### Ingredients

- 4 heads garlic
- 4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 medium russet potato, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 6 ounces pancetta or guanciale, cut into 1/4-inch dice
- 1 medium sweet or yellow onion, finely chopped
- **5** cups low-sodium chicken stock or vegetable stock
- ½ cup heavy cream
- **1** bunch lacinato kale, ribs removed and discarded, torn into small pieces salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- ½ cup shredded Gruyère
- sliced bread, to serve

### **Preparation**

Preheat your oven to 350 F.

- 2. Cut the tops of the stem ends of the garlic heads, exposing just the very tops of the cloves. Place each head on a square of foil, large enough to cover the head entirely, and sprinkle the exposed cloves with olive oil. Wrap the heads in the foil and place on a half sheet pan. Roast for 45 minutes. Remove from the oven and allow to cool in the foil.
- 3. Line a microwave-safe plate with a damp paper towel. Arrange the potato cubes in a single layer on the paper towel and cover with a second damp paper towel. Microwave for 3 minutes, or until they



just begin to soften. Alternatively, arrange the potato cubes in a single, even layer on a parchment lined sheet pan and bake for 10 to 12 minutes in a 350 F oven to soften. Set aside.

- **4.** Place the pancetta or guanciale in a Dutch oven and cook over medium heat until crisp and rendered. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the pancetta or guanciale to a paper towel-lined plate. Remove all but 1 tablespoon of the pork fat in the Dutch oven, reserving the rest in a small jar for another use. Add the onion to the Dutch oven and sauté over medium heat until translucent and just starting to caramelize, about 10 minutes.
- **5.** Squeeze the roasted garlic cloves out of their skins and into the Dutch oven. Stir in the stock and potatoes. Simmer over medium heat until the potatoes have completely softened, 10 to 15 minutes. Using an immersion blender, process the soup until smooth. Alternatively, carefully pour the contents of the Dutch oven into a blender and blend until smooth, then return the mixture to the Dutch oven. Add the cream and kale, stirring to combine. Simmer for 4 to 5 minutes to allow the kale to wilt. Season with salt and pepper.
- **6.** Serve topped with reserved crispy pancetta or guanciale, a sprinkling of Gruyère and a generous slice of bread.
